It is for individuals that want to support the FRRS/ Portola Railroad Museum, and yet DON'T plan to do any work around the museum during any visits.

LEVEL #2 - ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP \$25.00 per year. The Active Membership includes a one-year subscription to THE TRAIN SHEET and is worth ONE (1) vote in any FRRS elections. The price increase over associate membership is due to your Board of Directors deciding that ANY AND ALL MEMBERS that plan on doing ANY WORK at the museum (even one day) will be covered under the State of California's

Workman Compensation Plan/lnsurance. This way, we know who to enroll in this insurance plan. This protects both you and the museum in case of injury.

LEVEL #3 - FAMILY MEMBERSHIP \$30.00 per year. The Family Membership includes a single one-year subscription to THE TRAIN SHEET, and is worth one (1) vote ONLY in any FRRS efamily members lections. ALL will be added to the list of "active members" for inclusion in the State of California's Workman Compensation Plan/Insurance. A few of us namely Jim Ley, Hap Manit, Ken Roller, Hank Stiles and myself work 5 to 7 days a week at the museum. We are vol-We do unteers. We are not paid. the day to day work needed to keep our facility in some assemblance of order. When other volunteers come up to work on weekends or at other times we help them on their particular "goprojects. Usually we are fers" where is this or that, how do I do something worthwhile for the community and we believe we are preserving something tangible for future generations to enjoy. The work of the museum is not only painting a locomotive to make it look pretty, it is hauling the garbage, sweeping the floors, re-arranging seemingly endless accumulation of new "things." It may not be exciting work to put toilet paper in the restrooms, but it can be exciting not to find toilet paper when vou need it. There are phone calls to make and answer, mail to be picked up, sorted and answered or sent to appropriate people for action. Banking to it be done, bills to be paid goes on and one. Because of this it is difficult for us to take one major projects. We need more project people - people who will take on a job and follow it through to completion. There are small projects such as redecking a push car or painting garbage cans to major jobs like preparing a locomotive or car for paint. If you would like to see more done at the museum, ask yourself, "What can I do to help?"

CAR PARTS

Union Pacific donated 50 а foot box car to the Sierra Valley Community Hospital in Loyalton for storage of medical records, etc. As they had no use for the trucks, couplers or air brake equipment, they were given to us. We arranged for a truck to haul them to Portola. Sierra Pacific Lumber Co. loaded them for us and our Little Giant unloaded them assisted by crane operator Jim Ley. Norm Holmes and Hank Stiles supervised the project. The roller bearing trucks are now on our wheel track awaiting а need.

VISITORS

Valentine's Day/President's Day three day weekend brought about two dozen visitors to the museum. the most visitors we have had on any date this year. The fine, warm weather was welcome to melt the two feet of accumulated snow. During the last week of February, a number of visitors going to or from Winter Rail stopped by our facility including a group from the Revelstoke Heritage Railway Society, Revelstoke, B.C. Our visitor guest book contain 7,474 names registered in 1987 (up from 4,480 in 1986.) We try to get everyone to sign, but many do not. We estimate in excess 10,000 people visited of our museum last year.

AROUND THE MUSEUM

During February Hap Manit was busy up on the roof of the diesel shop with a snow blower to reduce the snow load and ice build up on the north side of the building. As the sun doesn't reach this section until late afternoon in the winter, the snow melts slowly and refreezes causing water to back up and leak into the building. Hap almost singlehandedly has been trying to keep ahead of the problem. The detail of hauling garbage, cleaning restrooms etc., may not be noticed unless it's not done. Those doing this work should be appreciated.

LA PORTOLA TAR PITS

The Union Pacific started cleaning up the tar pits in the balloon track area on March 15th. A contractor brought in equipment and started removing the old oil, some probably dating from early railroad times. Steam engines burned a heavy bunker C crude oil and in fueling or working on the engines a small amount was occasionally spilled. Over the years the oil was allowed to accumulate in a pond area near our balloon track. Being a heavy tar-like substance it wouldn't go away, so finally because of enviromental reasons it had to be removed. When the job is done in a month or so we will have a nice clean area. Union Pacific is to be thanked for accepting the responsibility for the cleanup. One of our museum locomotives is being used to spot cars for the contractor and in return they agreed to grade our parking lot.

Our next social meeting will be held on April 16, at 7:30 pm in the Diesel Shop meeting hall.

HOUGH LOADER

An ancient Hough bucket loader was loaned for our use last year. It ran, but not too well. owner, Pat Noble, borrowed The 1 t back last fall and when it returned it hardly ran at all. Since we have a need for such a machine on numerous occasions, we made an agreement with Mr. Noble to pay half the overhaul costs. Hank Stiles and Brian Challandar tackled the job. The engine was removed and taken to a local machine shop where the block was borred, crank built up and turned, valves ground and reassembled. The engine was then placed back in the loader. Hank welded aup all the broken welds and did some body work on the hood. Hap painted the engine compartment and chased parts. The engine was started and purrs like a kitten. It's ready for another 40 years of work.

TRACK WORK

February and March have been very dry this year. Our one man track gang, Ken Roller, got cabin fever and as soon as the snow melted he started workingon laying rail on Rip No. 3. By mid March he had 1,000 feet of track laid and was finishing the tamping. This will give us storage space for our growing collection. We really appreciate Ken's hard work and dedication.

OIL TANK

Union Pacific donated a former steam engine oil tank to our museum. The tank was in use as a car oil storage tank at Stockton and was no longer needed. It arrived in a WP mill gon and was lifted our and onto a concrete pad with our Little Giant crane. Larry Cope, Norm Holmes and Jim Ley made it happen. It will be used as an oil storage for steam engine fuel.

501 IS PRESERVED

The jewel of our locomotive collection arrived February 13th on the STSC from Stockton. The for-WP 501, WP's first diesel mer locomotive, a 1939 SW-1. was donated to our Rail Society by Corn Products Company who used it to switch grain cars at their Stockton plant. The 501 needed work, which some wheel Union Pacific did for us at the Stockton Diesel Shop. The unit was brought into our facility soon after it was set on our interchange track and was immediately the center of attention. As the unit was in running condition when donated, we filled the radiator with water and with a boost from 608's batteries the engine came to life and moved under its own power; the first time this engine operated in Portola in 49 years! It's almost funny to look at the V-6 engine block when you are used to seeing V-16's, but those 6 cylinders put out enought power for our needs. On Sunday some detail work was done including cleaning corn starch from the horn and bell. replacing the engineer and fireman seats and the door handle The independent brake repaired. valve was overhauled and returned to its proper function. Norm Holmes, Debbie Joyner (new member and volunteer who enjoyed her first day), Jim Ley, Dan Robirds, and Hank Stiles were doing the miscellaneous detail work. Later Ken Roller cleaned the cab and washed the exterior. Dan Robirds found a leak in an air brake cylinder and decided to go through all four cylinders and replace diaphrams, etc. We have a nice little switch engine and a very historic addition to our collection, thanks to Corn Products Co.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION

Our revised By-laws call for the election of three of the seven members of the Board of Directors 1988. to take office in June, John Ryczkowski, Dave McClain and Jim Ley's terms expire.
