Along with co-coordinator Kristina "KC" Dunn, with help from Eugene Vicknair, Secretary and Board member, and Patty Clawson of Big Fish Creations, we prepared for and ran the Pumpkin Patch Express on the weekends of October 20th and 21st, and October 27th and 28th. My husband, Ethan Doty, and Steve Habeck, FRRS President, put the wires up for powering the lights for the night runs. Ethan also built two seven-foot tall cemetery gate columns to begin our collection of spooky graveyard pumpkin patch decorations with the goal of having a unified theme and longer lasting decorations. Bil Jackson also created a baker's dozen

of small wooden tombstones on which I painted some funny names.

In discussions with Steve and Ethan, it was determined that since the

Silver Plate needed to be removed from the train consist this year, we would use most of the Santa Train consist in reverse order with the baggage car bringing up the rear. So with WP 2001 as power, the train consist was cabooses SP 4706, UP 25732, RI 17174, MP 13878, SN 1642, UP 25283 and FRRX 5653 (the baggage car). One major advantage in using this consist was having the power cords already run on 6 of 7 Santa Train cabooses, it would speed up the process of converting to Santa Trains since just the decorations were all that needed to be changed. I decorated the train as well as the Silver Plate, which was left in the Diesel Shop as a place for people to sit, eat and relax.

Although we had a bit of a delayed start on October 20th, with the help of Patty, Ethan, Debbie Reynolds, and Shaun Rowden, the pumpkin patch was decorated like a spooky

graveyard and the pumpkins were set out for purchase in time for the first run of the day that was further delayed by a kid pulling the emergency valve in the MP caboose.

> Last year on the night runs, Steve had success in spooking the riders of the train by having it slow to a stop just past Milward Switch and pulling the cords to all the lights on the train. It worked well and the screams could be heard all the way back at the Pumpkin Patch. This year, everyone just pulled out their cellphones and used them as flashlights, so no screams were

heard even with Steve banging on the cabooses and trying to scare people.

Museum Web Page Update - April 26, 2018 - Paul Finn

John Bartel from Sacramento TV station abc10 came to the museum on February 16 and did another video shoot, this time about the SPMW 208 rotary snowplow. Greg Elems managed the photo team the day of the shoot and sent me a nice selection of photos from the event. I created a new photo gallery for them so you can see them on the WPRM Photo & Video Gallery on the "About Us" pull-down menu.

After the new abc10, KXTV, video aired I posted a copy of it on our WPRM Photo & Video Gallery page. It includes video from the February shoot, historical film footage and video of the SPMW 208 throwing snow at Portola in 2008.

A new set of web-based tools have been created to help the Edenwold coordinator manage volunteer lodging at the museum. New information has been added to the Sleeper Reservation page on the Members pull-down menu to clarify lodging policies at the museum. A major new feature is an auto-updating Lodging Availability page that shows which quarters are Vacant/Occupied/Out-of-Service by date. Additionally, a secure web based tool has been created that allows the Edenwold coordinator to update the lodging database real time. If you plan to come volunteer at the museum and want to use our lodging facilities, please take a look at these expanded tools.

Recently, Headlight issue #50 published. Peter Arnold and I have been working on the Western Pacific Headlight Master Index web page on the Museum Historical/Archive Department web page. We now have all the issues, 1 to 50 indexed with 661 topics and 2,505 index entries. Having completed the first pass, we now plan to go back through the issues and see if there are additional items that should be indexed. I found the index very useful in creating the audio tour (highlighted in a separate article) this spring.

Museum Web Page Update - June 29, 2018 - Paul Finnegan

The 2018 Western Pacific Railroad Historical Convention is now history, but material from it is on the convention web page. The convention page is under the "History of the FRRS" section on the Historical/Archive Department home page. Additionally a page with photos from the convention and activities (including layout visits) is available at the same location as "Memories from the 2018 Western Pacific Railroad Historical Convention."

I have continued work on the new audio tour project for the museum. I have re-recorded all of the audio clips with better equipment so the sound quality is very much improved. There are now 102 items on the audio tour.

Work has continued on the Western Pacific HEADLIGHT master index. All 50 issues are now

included in the index. The master index is location on the Historical/Archive Department home page under "FRRS Publications."

After the convention and the "Light the Fire" dinner were completed, I made significant changes to the home page for the 2018 season. Kerry Cochran had requested I add a prominent link to the Historical/Archive Department home page on the society home page. I used the same photograph as in the page header on the Historical/Archive Department home page for the link, with the caption "Visit the Historical/ Archive Department...." Since adding this link, the number of visits to the Historical/Archive Department home page has increased.

Another major change I made to the home page was to create JavaScript code that will randomly pick a photo from a list to display each time the page is loaded. A returning visitor will likely see a different photo each time they load the page. Greg Elems sent me some outstanding recent photographs from around the museum that I combined with some of my own photographs to populate the list. If the user clicks on the photo, they get a full screen, high resolution, image of the photo. There also is a link to a gallery dedicated to these "cover" photographs so a user can see all the photos in one place.

As part of the Members' Meeting and Dinner event on June 2nd, the Model-T motorcar, M23, was re-dedicated and put back into service. A video was produced about the M23 project and is available on the "WPRM Photo & Video Gallery" on the "About-Us" pull-down menu.

Kerry Cochran requested that we create a special photo gallery "Around the Museum 2018" to highlight the events and people who make the museum work on a day-to-day basis. Using photos from Kerry, Greg Elems, Robbie Campbell and myself, I have put a new gallery together. I plan to add photos to it over the rest of 2018. We will still have dedicated galleries for the big events like RR Days, Pumpkin Trains and Santa Trains. If you have photos you would like to contribute to the gallery, please send them to me.

Museum Web Page Update - August 29, 2018 - Paul Finnegan

Since my last Train Sheet article, I have continued work on the new audio tour project for the museum. I have re-recorded all of the audio clips with better equipment and the sound quality is very much improved. There are now 102 items on the tour. After talking with visitors at the museum and other members of the society, I have decided to re-brand this project as the "Museum Tour" rather than the previously used "Audio Tour" name. Eugene Vicknair has begun making magnetic QR code signs that will be placed on the equipment. This will allow users that have a QR code reader on their mobile device to easily access the associated tour item.

RR Days 2018 is now history. I created a news item on the News Archive page, under the News pull-down menu that was used to promote the event. I also created a photo gallery on the WPRM Photo & Video Gallery page on the About Us pull-down menu. The gallery contains photos from the event and the yard movements to prepare for the event. Several members contributed to the gallery. If you have photos from this, or other FRRS/WPRM events that you would like to share, please send them to me.

On the technical side of the website, this summer we implemented Secure Socket Layer (SSL) encryption for the wplives.org site. The most visible difference is the URL displayed in a user's browser address bar will now be https:// rather than http://. The primary motivation for this change was many common browsers started to report non-SSL websites are not secure. I was concerned these warning messages may scare away visitors to our website.

Even though we don't handle credit card information, some of our crew and volunteer signup tools do collect personal information (such as names, email addresses, phone numbers, etc.). Now that we use SSL, a malicious user will not be able to intercept this type of information.

Working with Kerry Cochran and David Elems, I have released a new Mechanical Department Web page on the Museum pull-down menu. We expect that this will grow over time and capture information and materials important to the Mechanical and Operating Departments at the museum.

Working with Kerry Cochran and the Safety Committee, a new Museum Safety web page was created on the Members pull-down menu. This is intended to be the central point of contact for safety material on our website. This is also a work-in-progress and is expected to have more material added to it over time.

Museum Web Page Update - October 28, 2018 - Paul Finnegan

I have been continuing to work with Kerry Cochran to create a set of web pages related to modeling the Western Pacific and related lines. They were released to the public on October 12th. It includes indices to modeling articles in the *Train Sheet* and the *Headlight*. It also has modeling information and photos of WP and related road models. To see for yourself, go to the Archive/Historical Department's home page on the Museum pull-down menu. The link to the new modeling pages is in the "Historical/Archive Department Resources" list.

I received a very nice set of photos from Dick Couden, Greg Elems, Bob Sims and Eugene Vicknair from the September Steam Department work session. I also received a written report from Roger Stabler detailing the events of the week. I used this material to create a new photo gallery and a news item on the website.

I received the graphics for this year's Pumpkin Express event in October and added a link on the home page to the 2018 Pumpkin Express news item. As I received more information about the event, I updated the news item.

Santa Trains is coming soon; I will post information about it on the website as it becomes available.

The convention will be held May 2 thru the 5, 2019 at the McCellan Conference Center in McCellan Park, Ca. (just south of Sacramento).

There are going to be several California Zephyr presentations (that is my understanding right now) at this convention along with a lot of presentations given by the Pacific Coast Region of the NMRA.

Pumpkins Trains are on the way, get ready for the spooks and goblins. My understanding is that posters are printed and distributed for this event, please volunteer to help and remind all your friends to come and visit us.

Historical/Archive Department Report October 12, 2018

The last couple of months we have been getting several donations of various railroad artifacts.

Some of these donations have come from Director Bob Sims who found a WP Diner 504 Silverware Wooden box, and CZ Silver Two piece try and cover set plus over 25 WP books that he had.

One of our new volunteers, Randy Morton, has been donating several WP artifacts including a book of San Francisco track plans, WP/SN/TS Joint Facilities book, WP/SN/TS Industry Switch Lists, Pacific Car Demurrage Bureau Circular No 1 Instruction to Station Agents and more.

I was contacted by a Mr. Duncan for an estate that indicated a certain collection of railroad books, magazines and video tapes be donated to us, and with the help of the Museum Store and the volunteers at the museum, on September 26th 25 boxes of books, five boxes of magazines and one box of video tapes were dropped off at the museum and placed into the container until I can get them moved into the archive car.

On September 9th, with the help of Paul Finnegan, Eugene Vicknair and Chris Kaprielian and museum volunteers Greg Elems, David Elems, Ethan Doty a portion of Stephen Cavanaugh's Western Pacific HO layout was moved to the museum to become a new display. Look for more on this move on the website

We are still getting several inquiries and have been answering them as time permits.

One of the questions had to do with a gentleman working on a model train and wanted information on the Oro Dam Builders. One good thing about this request, we had an article in Issue of Headlight issue 13 that Kent Stephens did for us. I was able to get the person hooked up with the museum store for payment and I made a copy of Headlight issue 13 and sent it to him.

While not all the inquiries have been answered yet, we are still looking into pulling the information out of the Historical/Archive files in order to answer the questions. I have been able to answer some questions, however others are still pending.

All nominees must be valid FRRS members in good standing.



Steam Work Session September 2018

I arrived at the museum the morning of September 24. I started the week by helping Greg Elems work on the WP1503, removing the vinyl stripes from the pilot plates and sanding the under carriage. Greg sanded the car body for painting. We continued that work until Tuesday afternoon. Steve Lee arrived at the museum and dropped off the tube roller. On Wednesday I started prepping the remaining tubes to roll, it took most of the day to shim the tubes. At the end of the day, I helped

Thursday saw the addition of Erik Olson and Channing Walker to the team. Eric installed the blow-down valve on the engine and Channing repaired the bottom of the sandbox so it can be put back into place. Eric and Channing then went to work prepping the 5 1/2" flues. They spent the next two days getting them in and cut to length. The next step will be to roll the flues in the spring. Dick Couden came in and spent Thursday afternoon and Friday making and installing bolts so the water tank is now secured to the tender frame. Dick was assisted by Bob Sims and Steve Lee in this effort.

I spent Friday in the firebox rolling the 2-inch tubes, finishing the job on Saturday morning. Hank Stiles and Mike Mehcam showed up on Saturday and worked at locating and putting all the washout plugs back into their respective holes. Bob Sims worked at modifying the cab floor so it is easier to move if necessary and Bob finished up the engineer's side floor. Kirk Baer came in the afternoon and painted the sand box that attaches to the front of the tender.

Saturday was the day that the WP165 was scheduled to get the oil tank put back into the tender. David Elems moved the oil tank and positioned it so the derrick could be used to make the lift. Charlie Spikes and Roger Stabler, with the assistance of the Steam Crew, switched the WP165 out to the east yard and got the tender positioned so the tank could be set in. The lift took much longer than anticipated as the derrick had some minor problems that we had to fix before the lift could be completed. I found a few more things that need attention before we use the WPMW 37 again. With the lift completed, the engine was put back into the shop. I wanted to do a boiler wash and permanently couple the tender to the engine, but we ran out of time and daylight so this job will wait for the spring workweek. During the winter, David Elems will be making thread adapters so our safety valves can be fitted onto the dome lid. David Wallace showed up late Saturday. I retrieved a quadrant for the power-reverse lever out of the steam boxcar so David can use what was left of the old one and the used one to make a working power-reverse lever.

It was a productive workweek and I thank all who showed up and helped get the WP165 closer to running.







Track Work September 2018

To keep the trains on track for smooth and safe operation, we need to continuously maintain the track at the museum. Loren Ross pulled together a group of museum volunteers to replace the frog on the west 1-2 switch starting on September 17, 2018.

A frog is (as defined in the Western Pacific Glossary of Railroad Terms):

FROG - A track structure used at the intersection of two running rails to provide support for wheels and passageways for their flanges, thus permitting wheels on either rail to cross to the other.

The frog in the switch on the west 1-2 switch was broken because the ties under the switch were bad and the track moved every time locomotives and cars were moved over the switch. It is a lot of work to replace the frog and the long ties that are needed under a switch, but our volunteers stepped up and got the work done in only three days.

The work started on Monday, September 17th and was completed on Wednesday September 19th. A big thank you is due to the volunteers who stepped up as Willing People. The team included (in addition to Loren): Ethan Doty, Steve Habeck, Greg Elems, Duane Vander Veen, Charlie Spikes, David Elems, and Randy Morton. Randy Morton, the newest member to our track gang, is also a retired UP engineer. He also put time in M-of-W early in his WP career.

Moving Stephen Cavanaugh's WP HO Layout to the Western Pacific Railroad Museum

Stephen Cavanaugh, a well-known modeler and Feather River Rail Society member, created his Western Pacific Railroad HO model layout in his three car garage at his home in Tracy, Ca. His layout has appeared in the Model Railroader January 1994 issue and in the Model Railroad Hobbyist magazine in January 2011. Stephen passed away on January 7, 2018.

Cavanaugh had a passion for trains that developed in his early childhood years and spent a great deal of his life as a model railroad hobbyist traveling to various roadshows and exhibits. In fact, he was such an enthusiast that he almost perfectly replicated the western pacific railroads piece by piece. You can see the level of detail in action that was featured in the Model Railroad Hobbyist magazine. This was one of his great achievements: "Steve's masterpiece", as one of his brothers put it.


Several modelers, including Robert Hoffman,

Scott Inman, David Stanley, Doug Peterson, Patrick Davis and David Vipond started a project to save and move a small portion of Stephen Cavanaugh's Western Pacific Railroad model layout to the museum. When they ran into problems, Eugene Vicknair and I had several telephone conversations on how to go about saving this model layout.

Once it was clear if we did not move it by a certain date the layout sections would be forever be lost to the dumpster. With Eugene's help, I contacted the family and made arrangements to meet them so that I could get some measurements and see just what we were up against. Once that was done, I contacted Paul Finnegan and asked for his help (knowing he is in the Bay Area and is retired like me) we set a date and met with the family at Stephen home and prepared the remaining sections of the layout for transportation. (This in itself took 6 hours plus 2 hours travel time each way.)

Then on Sunday September 9th, with the help of Eugene, Eugene's friend Chris Kaprielian, Paul and myself, we loaded the layout sections onto a trailer. Paul and I then transported them to the museum. (We started at 7:30 AM and we arrived at the museum at 4:30 PM, another long day)

I want to thank Stephanie and John Busam, Stephen's daughter and son-in-law for all the help in making this take palace. I need also thank the original crew who tried at the first attempt: Robert Hoffman, Scott Inman, David Stanley, Doug Peterson, Patrick Davis and David Vipond and the Sunday crew of: Eugene Vicknair, Paul Finnegan and Eugene's friend, Chris Kaprielian.

James Gronwald's Layout

The 2018 WP Historic Convention was held in Salt Lake City, one of the many events was a layout tour of James Gronwald's Layout.

James models the D&RGW coal hauling in the Soldier summit area in the 1950-60's era. The room is a basement room 14 x 20 feet with a dogleg of 13 x 19 feet. He has around 300 feet of double mainline track. This part of the layout is about 80% done and James's has done some outstanding hand carved mountain work, which you must see to believe. The backdrop scenery paintings by Rob Spangler are spectacular. In May of 2013, James started construction of the second phase of his layout that will be the SLC area of his layout. This phase is the new SLC area with many industrial sidings. This area is about the same size as his first phase. Control is Digitrax DCC.

2018 Western Pacific RR Historical Convention - Eugene Vicknair

For 2018, the FRRS brought the WP Convention to the eastern end of the railroad for the first time. Held at the DoubleTree Inn near the Salt Lake City Airport, within sight of former WP connection the Salt Lake, Garfield and Western Railway, the convention spanned four days of events, from Thursday, April 19th to Sunday, April 22nd. In addition to the volunteer staff, vendors and presenters, over 80 WP devotees attended the convention.

The opening event was a special excursion via the UTA Frontrunner commuter line on Thursday morning. A tour bus departed the hotel for the North Temple Frontrunner station for a fast train ride to Ogden and the Utah State Railroad Museum, where the group enjoyed a guided tour. The return bus ride stopped at the Frontrunner Maintenance Facility in Salt Lake for another guided tour before returning to the DoubleTree and the start of the convention shows.

Thursday and Friday featured two layout tours and a guided tour of the DRGW-WP Salt Lake Depot. All events were held both nights to give everyone a chance to enjoy them. Rob Spangler and James Gronwald kindly opened their home layouts for visits, while Don Hartley, lead architect with the Utah State Office of Historical Preservation, gave a presentation on the depot's history then led visitors on a guided tour of this great structure.

The layout of the Golden Spike Train Club, located in historic Wasatch Hot Springs Building in North Salt Lake, was open to convention goers on Saturday and much WP and DRGW equipment was run. Our final layout tour took place on Sunday at the home of Allen McCallum just south of Ogden.

Many compliments were received on the breadth and quality of the convention shows this year. After opening with part 1 of a newly scanned set of Virgil Staff films from the FRRS Archives, the organizers of the 2019 NMRA National Convention, being held in Salt Lake City next year, gave everyone a preview of what to expect. Closing out Thursday was Frank Brehm's extensive documentary show of WP's first through passenger trains between Oakland and Salt Lake City.

Friday began with a special presentation of the video made at the 100th Anniversary Rededication of WP business car 106, the "Charles O, Sweetwood". Kerry Cochran gave us a look at WP's Maintenance of Way fleet and how to model these unique cars. Former WP mechanic Ed Smith shared his experiences working for the Western Pacific. Mr. Smith also donated to the FRRS Archives the toolbox and tools he used during his years on the railroad. These included several special and handmade tools, including one build by the WP blacksmith at Portola. Friday's closing shows were a history of WP's Mixed Trains and the cars they used by Eugene Vicknair, and Daniel Kuhn's look at the entire Feather River Route.

On Saturday, Jeff Pierce shared his memories of Growing Up Along the Rio Grande, while WP modeler Rob Spangler presented his knowledge and techniques for building scenery. Following the lunch break, everyone saw the second half of the Virgil Staff films, then an in depth history of WP connection Tooele Valley Railway by Jacob Wayne Lyman. Our closing show was a fascinating look at the murals painted by artist Mary Lawser for the California Zephyr, researched and presented by Allan Huskins Jr.

Saturday night, after a little confusion as to where the banquet room had moved to, everyone enjoyed a lavish feast and the giving out of the raffle prizes. The event was closed by our special guest speaker: former head of the UP steam program and current volunteer and advisor on the WP 165 restoration, Steve Lee.

Our vendor and exhibit room was well attended. Convention goers got to see a large selection of artifacts and photos from the FRRS Archives. The museum store did a good business as well in both merchandise and raffle tickets. Many other vendors and exhibitors also joined us

including Brad Lomazzi, the Rio Grande Modeling and Historical Society, ExactRail, the Tooele Valley Trackers Model Railroad Club, Ron Mitchell, Bob Jarvis and artist Marc Desobeau. Several of these vendors also donated to the raffle drawing, while Mr. Desobeau debuted a fantastic new painting in progress and put it up for silent auction to benefit the FRRS Archives Fund. FRRS and RGM&HS member Jeff Pierce was the winner of the painting depicting WP GP9 732 at the shop building in Salt Lake's Roper Yard. Finally, the Ophir, Tintic and Western model club from Orem, Utah brought their N scale modular layout and put it on exhibit in the vendor room. Everyone seemed to enjoy the layout and a lot of compliments were given to the OT&W crew.

So many people contributed to making this convention as success. First of all a special thank you to Jeff Pierce who was our point person for so much in Salt Lake. Derrick Klarr of UTA / Frontrunner helped set up the excursion and tours on Thursday. Mike Murphy helped organize the layout tours and lined up some presenters. Kerry Cochran aided in planning and organization while Paul Finnegan kept the website up to date with registration and show details. A big thanks to David Elems, who ended up handling the Society sales table for most of the event. Thanks also to Mike Carlson, Alicia Johnson, the Utah State RR Museum, Don Hartley and the Utah State Office of Historical Preservation, our fantastic home layout owners, the Gold Spike Train Club, the national NMRA, the RGM&HS, the numerous door prize vendors (with particular thanks to Kadee, Bowser and Accurail), Marc Desobeau for his generous donation, the FRRS convention volunteers and everyone who attended this great convention!

The 2019 Convention will be a joint event with the Pacific Coast Region NMRA and will be held in Sacramento May 2-5, 2019. Not only will we be celebrating 70 years of the California Zephyr, but it will also be the 75th anniversary of the PCR. Registration is now open! Go to the website at convention.wplives.org.

Things around the Museum - SP Fire Truck 1 - Paul Finnegan

The SP 1 Fire Truck is a 1952 GMC; it was bought new by the Southern Pacific and spent most of its life in the Sacramento Shops. It was the facility fire truck until the shops were closed in 1999. The truck wound up being owned by Jim Dobbas, and was stored for quite a while in the Erecting Shop in Sacramento.

Jim Dobbas then moved it to his property outside of Colfax. FRRS member Rod McClure arranged the donation of the truck to the FRRS from Jim Dobbas, with the condition that we keep it inside, protected from the weather, as much as possible. When the FRRS went to obtain insurance on it, we had a bit of difficulty, since it was never registered by the SP while it was in the shops.

Since coming to Portola, we have displayed it at the museum and taken it to a few special events. It was a hit at the 2009 Hot August nights show in Reno and drove around the parking lot wailing its siren!

The truck is mostly operational, but needs some engine work, new tires and rims.




