The WPRR Museum operates passenger trains every weekend from Memorial Day through Labor Day, and some additional "special" trains along the way, including our October Pumpkin Trains, and our December Santa Trains. Begin your journey with us as you become a student brakeman in our in-house training program. Certified instructors will teach you the basics of railroading, including instruction on coupling and un-coupling cars, hooking up brake air hoses, giving hand signals to the engineer, and throwing switches to change tracks.

To get started, you must first join the Feather River Rail Society and then attend one of two annual training classes where you'll begin your official training. This year the classes will be held Saturday May 9 and Saturday May 23 at 10:00 a.m. You will receive in-depth instruction and take a rules examination. Not to worry, the test is "open book". You'll also be asked to provide an emergency notification form and sign a Liability Release. Upon completion of the training class, you'll be an official member of the Operating Department. Your future career begins as a Student Brakeman and you can work your way up the ranks to Conductor, Fireman, and finally Engineer. "WP" also stands for Willing People. We need people who are willing to help keep the Western Pacific alive for years to come. COME JOIN US!!

What the heck is a RETAINER?

- WP Operating Department Training Manual - 1974 RELEASE CONTROL RETAINERS: In normal operation, release of brakes occurs at the same time as recharging, consequently the brake pipe cannot be recharged without releasing the brakes. Under certain conditions, such as long heavy grades when dynamic



brake is not available, this is undesirable. To provide a means of keeping brakes applied while recharging, freight cars are equipped with release control retainers. Although, in the interest of simplification, our text and diagrams so far have shown brake cylinder air exhausting directly to atmosphere, on freight cars it is exhausted through a retainer. This retainer can be set to exhaust directly to atmosphere or set to retain a given amount of brake cylinder pressure. These retainers must be set manually in accordance with timetable instructions.

Things around the museum – Binnacle from WP Tug HUMACONNA

In early 1987, former Western Pacific President Myron Christy knew of some important artifacts our museum would like for our collection. He contacted Mrs. Walter Brumberg and arranged for the donation of the binnacle from WP's tugboat HUMACONNA. The binnacle housed the magnetic compass for the boat. The correcting spheres on each side were used to correct the compass errors introduced by the metal of tugboat. It is on permanent display in our Collections Room at the museum.

The Humaconna's official number was 218071. She was built in Superior, Wisconsin, in 1919; tonnage 418 gross; 190 net; steel hull, length 142 feet, beam 27.5 feet; draft 14.6 feet; engine 1250 h.p.; two Scotch marine boilers, reciprocating engines.

In 1949 she was working 24 hours daily between Oakland and San Francisco except between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Saturday, with steel barge No.3 in tow. Approximately 300 rail cars were handled daily on barges, operated under the jurisdiction of the yardmaster at Oakland.

Western Pacific Reefer PFE 55069

After the intense flurry of work to get the side of WP PFE 55069 stabilized and painted before the Santa Clara County Fair, things slowed down a bit as we continued the evaluation of the car structure.

Unfortunately, it was found that the painted side had been subjected to beetles and termites over the years, which has damaged nearly every piece of sheathing on that side. However, the critters appear to have remained in the sheathing and not infiltrated the underlying structure of the car, meaning new siding is all that is required. A lumberyard in Newark carried the correct profile and wood type so a ready source of siding is available, however it is not cheap. Doing one side of the car will cost about \$2,500.

With help from non-member Christopher Kapreilian, I was able to remove the last intact outer ice hatch. Although in poor condition, it can serve as a pattern for new hatches. All inner hatches are present and look to be in reasonably

good condition, although one or two may need to be replaced. Overall, the roof looks in fine shape, although the wood is almost all gone. Only one small area of the sheet metal roof showed rust-through. The rest of the metal and most of the hatch hinges and latches look to be in good shape.

The ice hatches have now been tarped for the winter. In the spring, the plan is to start with repairs on the roof and replacing the missing walkway and outer hatches. In addition, we will stabilize the door that has been used as the only access. Forty years of use have finally caught up with it and it is sagging. Once the roof is done, we will likely move on to replacing the siding, one side at a time, and address the small amount of frame rot found on the side that was exposed to the weather and dirt.

Departure: Ken Iverson

Long time member and volunteer, Ken Iverson, passed away on Tuesday, October 1, 2019, in Red Bluff.

Kenneth Charles Iverson was born on June 23, 1938 in Los Angeles... specifically in his uncle's car. Ken was the eldest of three boys. Their mother passed away when Ken was 9 years old. Ken graduated from Coachella Valley High School in Indio, CA.

He studied Electrical Engineering in San Francisco, where he met the woman who would become his wife, Mabel "Missy" Hiatt. Their daughter, Evelyn, was born in 1956. During that time he worked at Standard Stations, Inc., which operated Chevron gas stations, and became the youngest assistant manager in the company.

In 1958, the family moved to Ukiah where son David was born. Ken took a job at Masonite followed by a position with the City of Ukiah. He later worked for the California Division of Highways, now known as CalTrans. Employment at the California Department of Water Resources resulted in the family's relocation to Tracy, California, in 1964, and then to

Gustine, California, until his retirement in 1994. While in Gustine, Ken served as chairman of the city Planning Committee and was on the Gustine School Board.

After retirement, he and Missy moved to Portola, where Ken became an active volunteer for the museum. He was a regular engineer in the "Run-A-Locomotive" program. Ken also served as our Facilities Manager and regularly pitched in on various facilities projects. He was instrumental in some of the early planning for the Facilities Master Plan. For a couple years, he was also part of the election committee.
