WPRM RECEIVING \$1 MILLION GRANT

The Western Pacific Railroad Museum is pleased to announce that we have been selected to receive a \$1 million grant from the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development Fund. This grant will be used for phase 1 construction of our Frederick Whitman Multi-Purpose Building. The application for this funding was overseen by FRRS Director Eugene Vicknair and was made possible with the generous assistance of California District 1 Congressman Doug LaMalfa and his staff.

The Whitman Building's main structure will be a 100 ft. by 200 ft. steel building kit that the FRRS has been purchasing from Olympia Steel Building Company. When fully complete, it will feature a custom facade based on the Western Pacific's Ferry Terminal that formerly stood in Oakland, California. Named for one of the WP's longest serving presidents, the building will feature five tracks for display of equipment. When complete, it will feature temperature control of the internal environment, modern ADA compliant restrooms and a 6 ft. high neon sign on the roof, based on the one that once graced the Ferry Terminal building.

Key features of the building will be gasketing in the rail flangeways, power outlets in the floor and water / drainage hook-ups that will allow its use as a community event center, emergency evacuation shelter or mass casualty support center.

The FRRS is currently completing the last requirements for release of the funds and pulling together a local team of contractors to finalize design details, work with the city and county on all permits and other requirements and begin pre-construction work leading up to a formal groundbreaking.



President's Pin

This year is our 40th anniversary with the formation of the Feather River Rail Society. In August 1983, the WP F7A 921-D was handed over as



the first piece equipment to start the collection at the Portola Railroad Museum which today encompasses 159 pieces of rolling stock. In September of 1983, the Feather River Rail Society was incorporated. In December 1983, the UP leased the current campus to the City of Portola with a sub-lease to the FRRS. Over the ensuing years, many more pieces of WP equipment came under our umbrella along with some other notable pieces.

Fast forward to 2004 and the Portola Railroad Museum became the Western Pacific Railroad Museum. At that time, we narrowed the focus on our collection and goals for the society to focus on the Western Pacific and its related subsidiaries and connections. We had a core collection of WP equipment, railroad papers and location that made this a logical move. Over the years, some non-WP equipment was de-assessed and other WP related pieces added to the collection. While we do have non-WP equipment, some pieces are part of the telling of the WP story. One item that comes to mind is the SP bay-window caboose 1337. As was discovered some time ago, this was the caboose WP leased from the SP to test steel bay-window cabooses. The use of that caboose led directly to the WP 426 series of cabooses. There are many other pieces of equipment that have a history with the WP even though they are not WP pieces.

So this year is significant for the fact we've been around for 40 years. Nineteen years ago, we narrowed our focus to the WP. The question is, where will the next 20 or 40 years lead for the society? We hope to go big in the future with the start of the Whitman Multi-Purpose Building, land acquisition and more track laid to lengthen our train ride. All this will take time and energy that has to be integrated with our current

restoration plans. We hope to acquire a few examples of the late 1970s WP freight cars and engines that are still out there. And we now have a 1910 WP Pullman coach to restore for use with our WP 0-6-0 steam engine 165. Lots of exciting projects!

Along with the Whitman building, we are working on improving the museum and making it more ADA accessible. Grounds improvements, drainage improvements and added walkways being the items on the top of the list. Talks with UP on several fronts for land and equipment are going on to help move our plans forward. Talks with other railroads on ex-WP equipment are on going as well. As these plans develop, we're able to do some items, but others will require us to fully control the museum property, so that is why we're in negotiations for land purchase from the UP.

I invite you to come up to Portola and see what is going on. Check out our ideas and the projects under way. We have some exciting things to show off. Our plans are a positive move forward for what we can accomplish in the next 20 to 40 years. Also, if you know a WP, SN, TS, etc. fan who is not a member, or just someone who enjoys getting hands on with rail preservation, bring them along and invite them to join the FRRS. We are also always looking for more volunteers to help move things along.



In addition to the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development Fund grant described on page 1, we have also received a \$10,000 grant from Plumas County for improvements to the drainage and storm water management along the north side of the building. We also have several other grants in process or under consideration, including \$70,000 from two grants for ADA and public access improvements and \$400,000 in additional funding for future phases of the Whitman Building.

We started off the weekend with an engineer's meeting and training session Saturday morning with David Elems leading the training of what the requirements of each and every engineer, fireman and trainmen in the daily locomotive inspection process.

This included the required documents on a daily basis for each of the locomotive used. We must keep records to meet the FRRS and FRA requirements.

Once the engineer's meeting was over we all headed over to the WP 1503 for hands on training of the locomotive inspection process and record keeping. While this gave all of us the opportunity to get a refresher on startup and operation procedures.

This led us into the weekend caboose train operations of running the caboose trains for the public.

2023 Convention Report

This year's Joint NMRA/PCR/FRRS Convention was held at the Courtyard by Marriott Cal Expo in Sacramento April 26th to the 30th.

This convention was the third joint convention in cooperation with the NMRA/PCR/FRRS (National Model Railroad Association/Pacific Coast Division/Feather River Rail Society), Like other convention held in Modesto (2016) and Sacramento (2019), the groups had a convention committee made up of members from each group that meet for several months planning the convention.

The convention started out on Wednesday April 26th with an evening reception and by early morning Thursday April 27th there was a busy schedule to get all the events set up and ready to start the opening clinics and presentations by 8:30 a.m. The PCR members were busy getting the contest room setup and ready for all the models, photos and displays for the contests held under the PCR rules and requirements. (FRRS worked within these requirements and the PCR handled all the contests entry and awards).

Several of the convention committee members were busy getting all the rooms and services ready to open the doors. Eugene Vicknair and Janet Steeper worked on getting the WPRM museum store ready and several of our other members were working to get everything ready.

The convention continued from Thursday to Sunday. There were several very good clinics and presentations by our members, our friends and members of the PCR.

Several outside tours, including the Siemens Mobility Factory in Sacramento and the California State Railroad Museum.

Through the convention Model Railroad layout tours were held with 12 layouts in the area. These layouts were in several scales and by



many well-known modelers.

Sunday morning a breakfast was held prior to the PCR business meeting.

Overall the attendance reached 150 members of both groups with the FRRS having 37 members some of which hold dual membership in both organizations.

A convention survey was sent out and 60 attendees responded with an overall Extremely Satisfied with the convention. While there were some noted issues with certain services that were not available during lunch time.

As of this writing the final convention report is not completed yet and we hope to share that with the membership once it is completed and released.





Media Day 2023

On Thursday, May 18, the museum hosted a gathering of media professionals and local political figures to showcase recent progress and announce some future developments. The invited guests gathered in the "Silver Plate" dining car for refreshments, followed by a multimedia presentation by Eugene Vicknair covering a brief history of the Western Pacific and the FRRS, plus our recent achievements and coming plans.

The major announcement was the \$1 million grant the WPRM will be receiving for phase 1 construction of the Whitman Building, but other highlights included discussion of the \$310,000 donation received from the estate of Katherine Hale and how those funds are being used, details on proposed museum expansion including buildings and a longer excursion run, and the announcement that the WPRM is in negotiation with both Union Pacific and the Portola 192 development partners to secure and expand full ownership of the museum property. The Portola 192 main partners, Orin Bennett and John Hodgson were also in attendance and we publicly announced the partnership between WPRM and 192 to work together on improvements to the local utility infrastructure for the benefit of the museum and the future residential development.

Reaction to the presentation was very positive and we have used the enthusiasm to plan several meetings between WPRM representatives and elected officials at the city, county and state level. In addition, many of the media outlets have been or are planning stories to promote the museum and our efforts. Already radio KOH in Reno has made several news announcements concerning the museum that have been widely heard.


Annual Members' Dinner and Meeting

Western Pacific Celebration 2023

On Saturday, May 20th, as a prelude to the opening of the regular operating season, the museum held its annual Western Pacific Celebration. Due to the various events that had been held the week before, including Media Day, the SP Convention visit and the Motor Car event on May 14th, the museum had seen a lot of cleaning and reorganizing, as well as shuffling of equipment in the yard. This made for a great setup to welcome visitors and show off the facility.

While the original plan was for trains to be headed by WP 0-6-0 165, several factors kept the 165 in the shop. Instead, WP SW1500 1503 got the honors and led the caboose trains for the day. Visitors got a chance to tour several pieces of open equipment and get up close with some of our newer acquisitions, such as Western Pacific 1910-built coach first 302 which arrived last October and WP boxcar 61180, donated last year by the hospital in Chester.

Several docent tours were given by Eugene Vicknair, showing museum guests some of the key pieces of the collection and sharing details of WP history. We also had some of our new banners up which showcase information on several of our pieces of rolling stock, most notably WP business car 106, the "Charles O. Sweetwood" and WP 165.
